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Elaine Stuhr Leadership And Advocacy Award



Lloyd Bell Professor Emeritus, (ALEC), University of Nebraska-Lincoln Lloyd Bell is a Professor Emeritus in the Department of Agricultural Leadership, Education and Communication (ALEC) at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Lloyd began his career as an instructor of vocational agriculture in West Point, NE. He has been a faculty member in the College of Agricultural & Natural Resources (CASNR) since 1979.

Dr. Bell taught and advised extensively in the teacher preparation and instructional delivery program of ALEC. He coordinated both traditional as well as provisional agricultural education teacher endorsement programs.

Within the undergraduate curriculum, he specialized in program planning instruction and professional practice.

In 2019 he received the University of Nebraska system President's Outstanding Teaching and Instructional Creativity Award of Excellence.

Lloyd has served as vice-president for the American Association for Agricultural Education North Central region as well as president of the AAAE. He has received recognition from the North Central Region of AAAE as an Outstanding Agricultural Educator and for Distinguished Teaching. He has achieved the status of Senior Fellow within the AAAE recognizing his exceptional and sustained contributions to agricultural education.

Scott's involvement includes the Academy of Technical Sciences in Grand Island and helping to create the NCAPS Advanced Manufacturing pathway at South Central Unified. Scott has worked with Thayer Central on a partnership program where students take manufacturing classes at MetalQuest. He has also worked with Thayer

Central and Deshler Public schools on job-shadowing programs. He is currently working with Thayer Central on internship possibilities for local businesses connected to the CTE programs.

Scott serves as an advisor for the NCAPS Advanced Manufacturing pathway at South Central Unified, the Academy of Technical Sciences in Grand Island, the Precision Machining & Automation and Manufacturing Engineering programs at Southeast Community College, and the Advanced Manufacturing Design Program at Central Community College.

NCE Outstanding Administrative Leader Award



Dr. John Skretta Administrator, ESU 6 Dr. Skretta is the Administrator for Educational Service Unit Six which serves 16 school districts across five counties in Southeast Nebraska. Dr. Skretta has been a K-12 school administrator for over two decades and has been a school district superintendent, assistant superintendent, high school principal and began as a high school English teacher. He was the 2017 NCSA Superintendent of the Year.

Dr. Skretta helps oversee administration of the ESU 6 Perkins consortium, which has developed an innovative work-based

learning initiative through a cooperative effort with Seward County Economic Development, and has initiated enhanced partnerships with post-secondary institutions and businesses in the service area through ESU 6's affiliation with the York/Thayer/Seward Counties Manufacturing Partnership facilitated by SCC.

Outstanding Middle School Program Award



Columbus Middle School The Columbus Middle School STEM program is a comprehensive program for all 5th through 8th grade students. The STEM program focuses on the design process to solve problems in the areas of engineering, electronics, manufacturing, architecture and robotics.

Students explore different areas of STEM in each grade level which allows students to learn about careers within the Columbus community, gain technical skills, and learn how to use various kinds of equipment.

In 5th and 6th grade students are exploring STEM through the units of robotics, design, drafting, manufacturing, electronics and flight. In 7th grade Discovering STEM, students build trebuchets, create 3D modeling, and design and build scale model floor plans for homes. 8th grade Investigate STEM through mousetrap cars, programming VEX robotics and the assembly of parts in Solidworks.

Students apply their math and science skills, and work collaboratively to improve communication, creativity and critical thinking skills. The benefits of the STEM courses go beyond academic skills and teaches the skills needed for potential careers.

Outstanding Secondary CTE Program Award



Pathways 2 Tomorrow For five years the Pathways 2 Tomorrow or P2T consortium has offered career and technical education (CTE) classes to high school students within five career pathways: building construction, computer sciences, education, health sciences, and welding. Students may also enroll in classes to earn their Commercial Driving License (CDL). As part of the P2T consortium the Northeast Community College extended campus in West Point has offered classes for two years. All the programs offered through P2T are aligned to ensure transferability to all Nebraska public postsecondary institutions.

P2T, is facilitated through Educational Service Unit (ESU) #2 and includes seven-member schools: Bancroft-Rosalie, Emerson-Hubbard, Guardian Angels Central Catholic (West Point), Howells-Dodge, Lyons Decatur Northeast, Oakland-Craig, and West Point-Beemer.

Outstanding Postsecondary CTE Program Award



Metropolitan Community College's Early Childhood Program has a long-standing commitment to preparing students for the early childhood workforce. Using an innovative path forward approach in educating students, the program has developed several avenues for students to advance their careers while earning college credit toward an associate degree in early childhood education. Benson High School Magnet Academies

Benson High School Magnet's academy focuses on three factors: high demand, high wage, and high skill employment. Benson High School Magnet's academy is the only wall-to-wall academy high school in the Omaha Public Schools district engaging students through programs of study that range from business management and marketing to construction, architecture, and digital design; the nursing and medical healthcare field, human performance, and meeting the rising need for teachers. Every program includes options for student skills, appropriate certifications, and college credit opportunities.

The Benson High School Magnet's Freshman Academy and Health Professions Academy were recognized by the National Career Academy Coalition (NCAC) as a "model status" academy for the gold standard level of success. Students are offered connections with professionals beginning in the 10th grade and culminating in mentoring and internship opportunities as seniors. Students are offered the experience of running their own school store, accessing the CNA and Pharmacy Technician certifications or experiencing the work force through community board members including Turner Construction and local trade unions.

Eric has singlehandedly raised over \$125,000 from local businesses and industries to support STS pre-service teacher scholarships and paid internships. He embodies the passion for teaching and learning in the context of career and technical education combined with the vision of 'CTE for All'.

Daniel Phillips Director of Innovation for Career & College Readiness, Grand Island Public Schools Daniel Phillips is the Director of Innovation for Career & College Readiness for Grand Island Public Schools, responsible for the Academies of Grand Island Senior High, all career and technical education programs, and dual education partnerships within the district. He is responsible for all curriculum implementation as well as managing partnerships for all CTE programs.

Dan currently serves as the past-president of the Association for Career and Technical Education of Nebraska and serves on the Nebraska Career Academy Advisory committee to help establish and monitor Career Academy standards statewide.


ACTEN New Teacher of the Year Award
